Datganiadau o ddiddordeb/declaration of interests

Adran 1/part 1 Cyflwyniad/Presentation

Constructed in the early 1990's, Queens Arcade is now facing major challenges, partly due to the impact of St David's 2, and partly becuase of unit size and layout. The frontage to the Queen Street entrance has recently been rebuilt successfully, and this scheme proposes to alter the Working Street entrance likewise, by filling in the 'horseshoe' area, removing the curved steps and bringing the building forward to the street line.

An entrance will be maintained at ground level in the centre of the largely glazed facade, and the quality of materials will be improved. A large (17,000 sq ft) anchor unit is planned at first floor level behind the Working Street elevation. Two new

corner units will be formed at ground floor level either side of the entrance, and the enlarged circulation space could accommodate a cafe. The current escalator accessing the first floor will be removed, so opening up the view down the arcade.

The local authority have met with the applicants at pre-application stage, and a planning application has just been submitted. Their concerns relate to: the loss of the existing 'landmark frontage'; the loss of permeability and legibility through the arcade; the impact on disabled users; and the design quality of the Working Street elevation.

Summary of key points arising from discussion, to be read in conjunction with Part 2 of this report.

The Panel was pleased to review this important proposal for Cardiff city centre although we would have preferred to see it at pre-application stage. We understand the constraints involved, but we think that major issues remain to be resolved. In summary:

- We welcome the proposed infilling of the 'horseshoe' and the reinstatement of the building line along Working Street.
- The proposal will remove the existing direct upper level access between Queen Street and Working Street, so reducing overall permeability. Further thought should be given to how this could be maintained.
- The new upper floor retail unit would be visible only from Working Street, yet would have to be accessed via the escalators at the Queen Street end of the arcade. Although we appreciate the attempt to improve viability of the lower level retail units on Working Street, the proposal seems both convoluted and awkward. A staircase close to the Working Street entrance, linking the lower and upper levels, would greatly improve this situation.
- The architectural articulation and scale of the facade should respond more sensitively to the urban grain and context.
- The main entrance should be recessed slightly and doors should be of the appropriate size and quality for an arcade. The entrance should read as the entrance to an arcade, and not to a large shop unit.
- The transparency of the glazed facade at first floor should be ensured by planning conditions.

The project team pointed out that, unlike the Queen Street entrance, the Working Street entrance could not be configured as a two storey arcade, and would need to be handled differently. The project team's intentions behind removal of the existing

escalators at the Working Street end was to open up the lower level view along the arcade, making the space more attractive and accessible to shoppers.

The Panel agreed with the proposal to bring the building forward to the street line, but we had serious concerns about the effect of this proposal on the wider permeability of the city. Direct access between Queen Street and Working Street at the upper (Queen Street) level would be made far less convenient than it is at present.

Within the arcade, access to the first floor would be awkward and convoluted and we suggested the provision of a new staircase near the Working Street entrance, located in such a way so as not to impede views or a potential cafe use. This would enable a more direct access to the anchor store from Working Street, while offering a more robust and future-proof layout, which could respond to changing conditions.

The Panel would like to have seen a more evident connection with the pedestrian axis across the important public space behind St Johns Church. However, it was accepted that the requirements of some existing arcade tenants limited the scope for change.

The Panel thought that the proposed symmetry and scale suggested a sense of classical grandeur which was inappropriate, and we advocated a more flexible response to the varied urban grain and predominantly vertical axis of Working Street. We suggested that the remaining northern facade might be included within the scope of the project, so as to avoid two original and similar sections of elevation being oddly retained either side of the new intervention. The project team explained however that the proposal would not be viable if alterations to the superstructure were to be involved. While understanding the constraints, the Panel was concerned that the proposed facade was too bold, lacking in subtlety and sensitivity to the local character and context, and tending towards a 'retail park' response.

The anchor store tenant, Wilkinsons, do have cafes in their other stores and it is hoped that a cafe could be included here behind the first floor glazed frontage. While there is no guarantee of this, there could be a planning condition which does not allow the glazed area to be obscured.

We thought that the main entrance doors should be set back slightly from the facade. It will also be important that the quality of the doors themselves signal the nature of the space being entered – an arcade rather than a single retail unit.
